Dear friends and supporters of Lafaek Diak,

It has been a busy couple of months here at *Lafaek Diak* with new partnerships, new buildings and new programs for the communities in Triloka. In the coming months FLD will establish a mobile clinic to provide health care for hard to reach communities in the Baucau district. This will be an exciting development and a much needed service for communities isolated from public services in Baucau.

The situation in the country has returned to a sense of calm after the civil unrest in February. The United Nations Mission has commended the country's institutions and authorities for the way the situation was handled and their efforts to maintain peace.

In Triloka, farmers are beginning to prepare land before the wet season in November-December. Here's to hoping the rains arrive on time!

Wat/San in Triloka

In June, Triloka was visited by Allan Toole, a Wat/San specialist to conduct an assessment on the water and sanitation situation in the area. Allan spent a week in the community identifying water sources, areas of concern, infrastructure that exists and developing ideas for creating access to water for Triloka and Ostico.



Allan also demonstrated at the clinic low-cost effective solutions to improve water and sanitation including the Tipy-Tap model. A community meeting was held in the Triloka Clinic to demonstrate hand washing using a Tipy-Tap and the reasons behind the need to hand wash. FLD hopes to devise a cost-effective plan to utilize the water springs in Triloka and Ostico to improve access for the community so that they do not need to carry water long distances.

Expansion of Community Clinic and New Office for FLD

In February this year FLD applied for a grant to expand the community clinic and to house office space for the organization in Triloka. The grant, which was approved in July, is being financed under the *Australian Government's East Timor Community Assistance Scheme*. After many

hours of consultation and negotiations with the local community, building has commenced and is progressing well.







The new building will provide a community health library, a laboratory and overnight accommodation for patients traveling long distances to visit the clinic. The building will also establish office space and a permanent presence for *Lafaek Diak* in the community of Triloka, an opportunity few local NGOs have in Timor Leste. FLD staff will be busy writing proposals for medical equipment, medical resources and office furniture for the new building in coming months.

Alternative Schoolies in Timor Leste

In late November this year, the Triloka community will host a team of newly graduated high school students from Kalamunda, Western Australia, who will spend 10 days working with Triloka youth on various community building projects. FLD staff have been busy assessing appropriate projects and working with both communities preparing for the event. Schoolies is the celebration at the end of final year studies, where hundreds of young people descend upon coastal cities in Australia, usually in over inebriated merriment! The Kalamunda community is offering students the opportunity to celebrate in Timor Leste instead, by contributing to lasting projects for international development. The week will provide an excellent opportunity to develop relationships between the young people of both communities and to exchange learnings. The event is being supported by Youth Action Kalamunda and Rotary Club Kalamunda.

Community Health in Triloka

Doctor Seip has returned from leave in Germany and is again tending to a busy clinic in Triloka. FLD is indebted to staff from the Bairo Pite clinic in Dili who gave their time to assist while the

doctor was away. It is hoped this relationship will develop through shared approaches to community health and understandings by both clinics.

In July, the U.S. Navy Mercy Ship berthed on the shores of East Timor to perform surgeries and offer first class



medical care to needy patients across the country.

FLD responded to a call from Bairo Pite clinic in Dili, to assist the transportation of several patients onto the ship in the nation's captial. The Mercy ship made the visit to East Timor to perform a range of basic to complex surgeries such as cleft pallets and cancer tumors and was a rare opportunity for several patients in Triloka.

In August staff and volunteers prepared a visual display in the waiting room of the clinic to educate on the transmission of worms through poor sanitation. The materials were bought from the Mary McKillop foundation and have led to discussions and questions from interested patients.

Mobile Health Clinic

At the request of the Ministry of Health of the Democratic Republic of Timor Leste FLD will soon commence a mobile health clinic to provide primary health care for hard to reach communities in the Baucau region. The organization has sourced a suitable vehicle from Dili and is eagerly awaiting its refurbishment and service.

In the meantime, planning is underway to assess which communities to visit and which staff will operate the clinic. A schedule has been agreed upon to begin the visits to the far off communities in collaboration with Dr. Aida from Bairo Pite Clinic, who has a lot of experience in running mobile clinics and are keen to assist FLD develop this new program.

Agricultural program

FLD's Buffalo Bank has been put on hold while the new building is developed and organized. It is hoped the beginnings of a buffalo pen will be established by the community in November.

New Staff

In July, FLD was joined by two additional international volunteers to assist with health program and capacity development for 12 months. Mikaela, a nurse and anthropologist, will be assisting



the development of community health programs and the rollout of the mobile clinic. Charlie has a background in Community Development and is currently assisting with the management of the new building and finances. The pair have been brought to Timor Leste through the Australian Youth Ambassadors for Development program and are throwing themselves into learning the language and meeting the community.

Shaila, the Australian Volunteer has moved on, after 5 months with FLD, to a new job with the United Nations in East Timor. In the coming months FLD is hoping to hire an enthusiastic health worker from the community to assist with health promotion and education programs in Triloka.

Thanks to friends in Perth, WA, and the Uniting Church Synod of Western Australia the first community calendar for Lafaek Diak in 2008 was produced. Through combined efforts of friends in many places this raised USD \$ 7,720 for the work of FLD. The encouragement this generous effort has provided to staff in East Timor is greatly appreciated.
